Minister's Message—Sabbath as Celebration

This summer, as I enter an intentional time of sabbatical, the congregation is granted this gift as well. I pray that it is a time for intentional rest, renewal, and reflection. And for celebration.

We have heard the commandment – Remember the Sabbath and Keep it Holy – but what does it mean for Trinity in 2024? We break all the commandments regularly, but our addiction to 'busyness' prevents us from appreciating the joy of sabbath.

Sabbath is more than coming to worship or "Blue Laws" prohibiting the purchase of non-essential goods on Sunday. Our work schedules may not even allow us a free weekend in today's society.

How do we resist our over scheduled lives? How do we break away from alarms and deadlines? How do we remember sabbath, and truly honor the gift of rest?

Our Jewish siblings built an intentional practice of both rest and renewals, with traditions of Shabbat – weekly sabbath; Shmita - sabbatical year; Yovel – Jubilee year.

The Torah calls for Jews to work six days and rest on the seventh but also work the land six years, letting it rest in the seventh. After 49 years, seven cycles of seven, the 50th is Yovel.

In that Shmita year, debts are to be forgiven, agricultural lands to uncultivated, private land holdings to become open to the commons, and staples such as food storage and perennial harvests to be freely redistributed and accessible to all.

Like the sabbatical year, the Jubilee is one in which no agricultural work is to be done and the land is to lie idle and empty. It was a year of rest, renewal, and re-creation; for the people, and the land. The celebration also included everyone released from debts and slavery, so that all could start year one with a clean slate. It is probably different than what we imagine – and the Jubilee year has not been marked for centuries, but it is a beautiful theology. Even without Yovel, sabbatical time is central to life.

Sabbath days and sabbatical years are reasons for celebration, as we intentionally take time to connect back to what we are here and to recommit to our common mission. To see where God is at work and continue to tell that story.

We may not be able to erase our calendars, or limit how far we travel on Sunday - but we can reclaim sabbath practice. By minimizing our busyness, simplifying our commitments, and celebrating every opportunity to "break the cycle of 'more' that our world constantly asks of us: achieve more, accomplish more, perform more, possess more." (Walter Bruggemann).

Thanks be to God for the opportunity for us all to celebrate Sabbath in a new way.

Highlights from Co-Op Committee Meeting

The Co-Op Committee composed of clergy and lay leaders of each faith community discuss the functioning of the faith partnership, coordination of collaborative projects, and other items affecting the faith communities. At the 22 Feb 24 meeting the following items were discussed:

Shared History: Each faith community discussed the denomination & local history of their community and touched a bit on polity of each faith community.

Holiday Office Hours: Discussed when the church office will be closed during holidays.

Shared Service and Fundraising: Discussed having fundraisers associated with each meal after the shared service and how many fundraisers were too many during the year. Discussed other options related to fundraising, including loose change left in the offering plate during the shared service going towards a particular benevolence.

Electronic Sign Update: There is a scheduled meeting with an electrician to obtain an estimate to connect electricity to the sign. Once electricity is hooked up to the sign, an antenna will need to be placed on the sign followed by training on how to post signs.

Taizé Service: Noted relatively good attendance at the first Taizé Service and the soup supper. Need to coordinate tech support.

Stations of the Cross Installation: Posters for the stations of the cross will be installed. Each faith community will contribute to the cost for the posters.

New Interior Signs & Parkin Signs: Revisited estimate for one of the interior signs. Decided to go with a different company than with the company that created the outdoor electric sign.

Your Gifts In Action ~ Summit Stone

Mental Illness is common in the U.S., causing one in five U.S. adults to be living with mental illness. One of every two people in the world (and in the U.S.) will develop a mental health disorder in their lifetime. According to the Global Burden of Diseases, the U.S. ranked first with substance abuse disorders, 15th for anxiety disorders and 29th for depressive disorders. The most common mental illness is anxiety disorder, then depression. Yet, most people like to pretend that it is something that happens rarely and always to someone else. Because of the stigma of mental illness, it is still not something people like to talk about openly when it happens in their own family. It is important to understand that mental illness is a disease, just like diabetes or heart disease. It is nothing of which to be ashamed; it happens to people without their causing it.

Mental illnesses vary in degree from mild to moderate to severe. Some are easily treated with medication alone, some require medication and talk therapy, and some require in-patient hospitalization and close monitoring over a period of time.

In Ft. Collins, there is excellent treatment center for mental health disorders. Summit Stone was started as an outgrowth of the Larimer County Mental Health Department in 1957. It is now the largest provider of behavioral healthcare services in Larimer County serving more than 10,000 clients annually. There are four facilities, one in Loveland and three in Ft. Collins. Summit Stone provides substance abuse care, acute care, crisis services, group therapy, vocational support and peer support services. Trinity supports Summit Stone with our benevolence funds as part of our commitment to social ministry.

Ways to Give at Trinity

Become a Realm giver! Call the office to get an invite to REALM, our new giving platform. In Realm you can donate from a checking account, savings account or your credit card. Donations can be done weekly, monthly, or annually. Also, you can look at the history of your giving and even print a statement for your taxes. Check it out!

For **One-Time Donations** go to <u>www.trinitylutheranfc.org</u> and click on "Give" at the top of the webpage. Find One-time Donation and follow the prompts from there. Again, you can have the donation come from a checking account, savings account or your credit card.

Are **charitable rollovers** an option for you? If you are required to take a minimum distribution from your IRA, you might be able have the check payable to Trinity, and not pay taxes on the distribution (please check with your tax advisor, or financial institution). The same applies if you have a charitable donor advised fund. Check with your financial institution on the frequency that works best for you.

Does your bank offer their customers a **bill paying option**? You can check with your bank about this. Some banks do not charge for this convenience. Have **automatic deductions** from your checking or savings account, done weekly, bi-monthly, or monthly.

Have the Venmo app? Trinity is also on Venmo! We are "Trinity-LutheranFC".

Use Regular Offering **Envelopes**-either brought to worship or mailed in.
